Welcome to the November 2021 edition of the Dulles Direct newsletter. I hope you had a relaxing Thanksgiving and were able to visit with family and friends. The last couple years have been challenging to say the least, but it is important to take a moment and remember our blessings with loved ones. With the availability of vaccines, this holiday season definitely feels more "normal."

While other parts of the country have begun to experience upticks in COVID-19 rates, hospitalizations, and deaths, so far Northern Virginia has fared well. Colder weather generally means more sickness, so the Health Department encourages everyone who hasn't yet to get their COVID-19 vaccine and their flu shot. We will continue to monitor COVID-19 developments, especially the new Omicron variant that is causing global concerns.

The Stone Ridge Association held its annual meeting on November 16. Unfortunately, the date coincided with the Board's second Business Meeting of the month, so I wasn't able to attend, but my aide Jared Midwood was there to give an update from my office on redistricting,

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the FY23 budget process, and several projects of interest. Stone Ridge elected two new HOA Board members at the meeting, so congratulations to Christopher Kimrey and Ramu Mundrathi.

We reached a major milestone this month with the official groundbreaking for the **Northstar Boulevard project.** On November 5, the County broke ground on the long-awaited project to extend Northstar Boulevard from Tall Cedars Parkway to Route 50. This project will improve capacity and safety on the Dulles South road network while helping reduce congestion on Route 50. Shirley Contracting is building the \$45.8 million project, which currently has an anticipated completion date of winter 2024.



At my request, a "Pardon Our Dust" public meeting has been scheduled for tomorrow, December 1 from 7:00-8:00 p.m. at Arcola Elementary School (located at 41740 Tall Cedars Parkway in Stone Ridge). We know that projects like this can be disruptive to the surrounding communities, and we want to make the process go as smoothly as it can. At the meeting, residents will have a chance to meet the project team and get details on the stages of construction and ask questions. I hope you can attend. In the meantime, you can find more information on the Northstar construction here. For information on construction of the northern

COVID-19 UPDATE

Latest Numbers and Updates

According to the official numbers released today by the Virginia Department of Health, there have been 35,847 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Loudoun County. 303 individuals have died from the virus in Loudoun. Virginia now has 969,116 confirmed cases with 14,710 deaths. You can see these numbers yourself at the Loudoun County COVID-19 GeoHub.

Loudoun's latest percent positivity rate is 3.9%, up from last month but consistent with the virus' worsening as weather gets colder. The vast majority of newly infected people remains unvaccinated and includes individuals in all age groups. Governor Northam's indoor mask recommendation is still in place for all individuals, regardless of vaccination status. The majority of cases in Loudoun and nationwide remains the Delta variant, which is highly contagious and occurs in roughly two month waves.

Everyone should continue following proper mitigation practices, especially if you haven't received a vaccine or are around those with immune system issues. In addition to vaccination, the Health Department recommends everyone wear a mask in indoor public settings and practice prevention measures that include staying 6 feet away from people who do not live in your household; covering your coughs and sneezes; washing your hands frequently; staying home when sick; avoiding contact with sick people; knowing the signs and symptoms of

COVID-19

COVID-19; and getting tested if you're symptomatic or if potentially exposed to COVID-19, regardless of your vaccination status.

With the holidays approaching, Loudoun County health officials advise those who are planning to travel or gather indoors with others to take precautions against COVID-19. This includes getting tested if you think you may have COVID-19 or have been exposed to someone who has the virus. When getting tested before traveling, you want to consider the timing. Ideally, you should take the test close to the date when you are traveling or planning to gather with others, but far enough ahead to get results. Anyone who is exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19, such as fever or chills, cough, shortness of breath, fatigue, or a new loss of taste or smell, should get tested right away. Additionally, if you know you have been potentially exposed to someone with COVID-19, regardless of your vaccination status, you should get tested 5 days after the exposure. If you get tested because you have symptoms or were potentially exposed to the virus, you should stay away from others pending test results and follow the advice of your health care provider or a public health professional.

Many pharmacies and health care providers offer COVID-19 tests in Loudoun County. To find a provider near you, visit the <u>Virginia Department of Health's website</u>. Loudoun County also provides free COVID-19 testing weekly, on Tuesdays, at various locations. Next Tuesday, December 7, the County's testing event will take place at the Dulles South Recreation and Community Center (24950 Riding Center Drive) per my request. Testing will run from 10:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. To help reduce wait times, please fill out a registration form before arriving. Forms are available in <u>English</u> and in Spanish.

Latest News on Vaccination Efforts and Recommended Booster Shots

As a reminder, Loudoun County has resumed vaccination operations by appointment only at its Dulles Town Center site, located at 21090 Dulles Town Circle in Sterling. Vaccination remains the best protection against COVID-19 and the Delta variant.

The CDC is now recommending that everyone **ages 5** and older get a COVID-19 vaccine. Please check with your child's healthcare provider to see if they offer the vaccine. For more information on why children and teens should get vaccinated for COVID-19, please click here.

The Virginia Department of Health has authorized local health districts to administer booster doses of the Pfizer, Johnson & Johnson (J&J), and Moderna COVID-19 vaccines for anyone 18 years and older who has received their initial shots.

In addition, the CDC and VDH have approved a "mix and match" approach to boosters, allowing people to receive a different brand of vaccine for the booster dose than what they received in their initial vaccine series. For example, someone who received the one dose J&J vaccine could receive either the Moderna or Pfizer vaccine as a booster.

Anyone who received the J&J vaccine can receive a booster dose of any of the three vaccine types at least two months following their initial vaccination. Anyone who received their initial two-dose series of Moderna or Pfizer vaccine at least six months (180 days) ago is eligible for a booster dose of any of the three types of vaccine.

You can find the date of your second dose on your vaccination card. If you received your second dose in Virginia and have misplaced the card, you can find the date of your second dose by searching for your vaccine record <u>online</u>. If you need assistance over the phone, call 877-VAX-IN-VA (877-829-4682). Assistance is

available Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

All residents who need the initial series of COVID-19 vaccine or a booster may receive one from many providers in the community, such as medical offices and pharmacies including, but not limited to, CVS, Giant Food, Harris Teeter, Safeway, Walgreens, Walmart, and Wegmans. These locations have the benefit of being able to also provide the flu vaccine at the same time. Visit vaccines.gov to find a vaccination site near you.

To make an appointment for a COVID-19 vaccine at the County's Dulles Town Center site, visit <u>loudoun.gov/covid19vaccine</u>. The flu vaccine is not available at the Dulles Town Center clinic.

The Virginia Department of Health has added a scannable QR code to vaccination records. The technology allows anyone vaccinated in Virginia to show proof of vaccination with a digital or printed QR code instead of a paper card. If you have moved to Loudoun from another state since receiving your second dose, you should check with the health department from your previous jurisdiction for your vaccination record.

Loudoun County encourages everyone to stay informed about COVID-19 and the upcoming vaccination recommendations.

DULLES UPDATES

Route 606 Pavement Resurfacing

I am happy to report that VDOT's pavement resurfacing on Route 606 is finally complete, after many delays due to weather conditions and material shortages. Linear markings have been laid, and work in the area has been completed. Thanks for your patience while crews worked to get the final pieces of this project finished. Look for information in the spring on VDOT's 2023 paving projects in our area when they are released.

Conklin Park Athletic Court Closure

The Loudoun County Department of Parks, Recreation and Community Services has announced the closure of the basketball and tennis courts at Conklin Community Park, located at 25701 Donegal Drive in Chantilly. Both courts are being replaced. The extensive construction project is anticipated to take five to six months, depending on weather conditions, with anticipated completion next year.

Airport Impact Overlay District Revisions Input Session

Earlier this year, I reported that the Board of Supervisors had initiated a Comprehensive Plan Amendment (CPAM) to update the Airport Impact Overlay District for Dulles Airport to reflect MWAA's 2019 Dulles Noise Contour Update Report (an Airport Impact Overlay District is a type of zoning designation in Loudoun that is intended to delineate boundaries of where noise from airplanes is anticipated to affect residential, school, and commercial buildings). The County historically does not allow residential development in the areas with the most noise impact

(designated as the Ldn 65 noise corridor). It is important to note that there is a formula involved in the Ldn designations - it is not as simple as measuring the sound from individual aircraft.

The new contours have some new areas in the Ldn 65, and some areas that were previously in it were removed. Besides the Ldn 65, the other contours are the Ldn 60 and the "1-mile buffer." Historically, those other contours require notification to home buyers during purchase that they are buying a home in a noise contour and should expect airplane noise. The new CPAM removes the 1-mile buffer designation from this requirement, which I strongly oppose. My motion to restore it failed 4-5; however, I have had some discussions with colleagues about potentially reconsidering this motion as the CPAM progresses.

In addition, the Board created a carve-out from the Ldn 65 that was based on the future fifth runway at Dulles. Since the time the Board did the initial work on the carve-out, the Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority has undertaken some analysis of this area and I'm expecting them to provide the County with more specific information about exactly which sections in the Ldn 65 are driven solely by the potential of a new runway, and which areas are there because of existing airport traffic.

County staff will host a virtual public outreach meeting for the AIOD CPAM on December 13 from 6:00 p.m. – 7:00 p.m. via WebEx. This is your opportunity to provide feedback as the proposed revisions work their way through the process. I would encourage you to join the meeting and speak on restoring the 1-mile buffer around the Ldn 60, or any other issues you may feel strongly about.

DULLES LAND USE UPDATES

AT&T - Stone Ridge Antennas

CMPT-2021-0003

At our November 19 Business Meeting, the Board approved an application from AT&T to allow installation of nine panel antennas and related telecommunication equipment atop a water storage tank west of Stone Ridge. Because this application is a Commission Permit, there was no public hearing required under law. Instead, the application went through the Planning Commission (who voted to ratify at their September meeting). The Board of Supervisors then had 60 days to review that decision.

Throughout the process both at the Planning Commission and Board levels, there were some concerns by residents about 5G technology and health. Under federal law, the Board can only consider the land use issues related to the application and in fact is specifically prohibited from considering any potential health impacts. I reported last month that the only land use concern the Board tends to address on these types of applications is visual impact; in this case, however, that was not a concern due to the structure already being in place and the antennas being a modest size which does not really change the visual impact of the structure. Therefore, the Board legally had no grounds to deny the commission permit, and if we had done so, it almost certainly would have been overturned in court.

One area of interest that I did bring up during the discussion is recent communication from the Federal Aviation Administration regarding the potential conflict of certain 5G frequencies in close proximity to airports. According to the FAA, there may be interference with equipment used on airplanes at the same or close frequencies. This is a discussion occurring between the FAA and the Federal Communications Commission. There has not been any conclusive action taken, and therefore this was also not an issue that the Board could consider in this or any other telecommunications case. Should the FCC take action regarding 5G around airports, it would likely apply nationwide and supersede any local land use approval.

Poland Road Substation Expansion *SPMI-2021-0003*

At our November Public Hearing, the Board voted unanimously to approve a minor special exception application from Dominion Energy to modify the width of a Type C Buffer yard in a planned expansion area of their substation on Poland Road. The buffer backs up to existing data centers and thus isn't visible. The proposal was to reduce the width of the rear southern buffer yard from 25 feet to 15 feet to match the southern buffer yard of the existing substation. Staff recommended approving the application since a reduction in the rear southern buffer yard will lead to a consistent buffer width along the southern perimeter of the substation. My office did initiate a discussion with the applicant about the poor condition of the vegetation on the side that is visible to the public and Dominion has agreed to make improvements, which we should see by next season.

Bryant Property/Cedar Terrace *ZMAP 2021-0016*

If you recall from my June newsletter, Toll Brothers has split off from Peterson and is now working separately on half of what used to be Avonlea on the "Bryant Property." Toll submitted their application and is calling the project "Cedar Terrace." The application will be sent to County agencies for referrals and then eventually to the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors. Typically that process takes up to a year.

Toll's plan is to rezone the property located to the north of the South Riding Home Depot. The applicant has requested a rezoning that will result in approximately 75,000 square feet of retail development, a 6,000 square foot civic building, and 1,000 residential units (a mix of for-sale and rental) on the 47-acre site. A portion of the residential units would be age-restricted and attainable housing units for lower income residents. Over the summer, my input to the developer was that their application should be an appropriate mix of uses and should be complementary to Avonlea next door. The

intensity of the residential component of this project seems disproportionate to the amount of commercial space, and I will be very interested to read the comments from County agencies during the referral process, especially Planning and Zoning and the Department of Transportation and Capital Infrastructure. LOUDOUN UPDATES

Metro Silver Line Reaches Substantial Completion

I've certainly had my hands full on the Metro Board, as we continue to deal with the ongoing NTSB investigation into what caused a 7000 series railcar derailment and work to gradually bring back cars into service. It was therefore welcome news to hear from the Metropolitan Washington Airports Authority that they officially declared Phase 2 "substantially complete," which is a technical term that means Metro can now begin more substantial tests. From this point, Metro will conduct about 200 tests, and the independent Washington Metrorail Safety Commission will also do separate analysis. Once that is complete, the Metro Board will need to act to officially accept the project, most likely after legal agreements on various remaining items. After that, there will be about 90 days of operational testing and then service will begin. I can't put a date on that yet, but I'm hopeful it will be in the spring or summer of next year. It is important to note that Metro also needs the Dulles Rail Yard online to operate Phase 2, and that project has not reached the substantial completion milestone yet, though MWAA says it is close.

FY23 Budget Challenges

The upcoming County budget will be among the more difficult we've seen. For various reasons, early estimates have been swinging more significantly than in the past. There are a couple of major issues at play:

-Slow growth: Typically, the County sees enough new growth of all types to generate enough revenue to keep pace with growing expenditures. That was not the case over the past year.

-Overreliance on personal property taxes, primarily from data centers: Over time, our revenues have shifted from primarily real estate tax sources to personal property tax sources. In FY22, just 51.5% of County tax revenues were coming from real estate taxes paid by homeowners and commercial property owners. Our staff recommends that at least 60% of revenue come from real estate, which is a more stable source of revenue. Staff is therefore recommending that the Board take steps to shift more revenue to real estate from personal property taxes.

The equalized rate is the tax rate that would have the owner of real estate assessed at the average value in the County paying the same in taxes as last year. We have generally used this as a measuring stick of whether taxes are "really" going down. We have reduced the tax rate nearly 30 cents since I've been on the Board, and generally been able to keep the actual bills consistent from year to year. However, the pace of growth on the personal property tax side - especially the computer equipment, which primarily comes from data centers has outpaced everything else. In general, this is a good problem to have. Over the last few years, the Board has been using that "extra" revenue to pay down debt faster and fund one time expenses in the capital budget. However, there is only so much of that we can do. In addition, staff ended up overestimating the personal property tax revenue last year because several new data centers were not actually outfitted due to COVID-19, which has created budget issues for us this year and underscores the volatility of this budget source.

This year, the early estimate is that the equalized tax rate is going to drop significantly, as low as .89/\$100 assessed. The personal property tax rate has been steady at \$4.20/\$100 since the 1980s. The scenarios considered by the Finance Committee and recommended by County

staff would lower the tax rate, but not all the way to the equalized rate, and also lower the personal property tax rate to begin making that shift away from reliance on it.

Reducing the personal property tax rate will reduce the bill for data centers, but it will also reduce the rate on all vehicles, which is something I hear complaints about every year. As you are no doubt aware, the price of new and used vehicles has risen sharply, meaning that for some people, this year's car tax bill was actually higher than last year's because their car was worth more. It looks like that is going to continue next year given supply shortages. It would therefore be a good time to adjust the rate downward.

The Board is asked to give fiscal guidance to the County Administrator at this point in the process every year. This year, a motion to prepare the budget at a real property tax rate of \$0.99 per \$100 of assessed value passed the Finance Committee on a 3-2 vote, with myself and Supervisor Kershner opposed. I like the Board to have options during our budget sessions, and that includes options to go up and down from what the Administrator proposes. I always appreciate seeing what the first 4-5 items that the Administrator would take out of his budget would be, and the first 4-5 things he would add in. Unfortunately, the motion that passed did not provide those options to go down, and I think we also missed an opportunity to reduce the personal property tax rate further than just from \$4.20 to \$4.15. The full Board still has to vote on December 7, so I can try again.

Now, the obvious comment one would make is that instead of just looking at taxes to fund growth, the Board could reduce spending. That is of course true and I think there are some options that should be on the table. However, the reality is that it would be difficult for the Board to cut enough to make a significant difference in the tax rate. Our biggest expense is personnel, and the County typically provides around a 3% salary increase. Given inflation, I'd prefer not to reduce that. There are certainly some programs I do not support in the County budget (we'll get to one below with collective bargaining), but one penny on the tax

rate is the equivalent of about \$9 million, and even taking those things out of the budget probably wouldn't get us there. Many people have pointed out that the school system has seen reduced enrollment and should see less spending, and in fact their updated fiscal guidance reflects this. They are anticipating about a \$50 million increase, the bulk of which is the same relatively modest salary increases. This is \$75 million *less* than the Superintendent's last budget guidance over the summer, and the reduction of \$75 million is mostly due to enrollment decreases.

The County Administrator will present the budget at the beginning of February, and the Board will adopt a final budget in April - so a LOT can change. Nevertheless, I want to be clear up front that I think it may not be possible to get down to the equalized tax rate this year. Stay tuned.

Confederate and Segregationist Symbol Inventory Update

At our November 3 Business Meeting, the Board voted unanimously to move forward with some measures identified to eradicate Confederate symbols after staff completed a review of symbols Countywide.

The Board instructed the Director of the County's Office of Mapping and Geographic Information to initiate renaming Jeb Stuart Road and Fort Johnston Road.

Furthermore, the Board voted to have staff coordinate with the Town of Round Hill on renaming streets in the the Hillwood Estates Subdivision, several of which were named after confederate generals. Finally, the Board voted to direct staff to draft amendments to Chapter 1020 of Loudoun's Codified Ordinances to establish a new section covering confederate and segregationist names per policies identified in the ongoing Board inventory process (and give authority to the Director of the Office of Mapping and Geographic Information to initiate renaming roads that are in violation of the new General Naming Standard). I made a friendly

amendment to Supervisor Saines' aforementioned motions that the Board will be notified when any such actions take place.

The good news is that there were actually relatively few names and symbols identified, especially compared to many other jurisdictions. The cost associated with these changes is expected to be relatively minimal, and there is plenty of precedent for the Board to change certain street names for various reasons.

The Board will also be finalizing recommendations related to Route 7 and Route 50 at our December 7 meeting. My preference is to go back to the historical names of those roads - Leesburg Pike and Little River Turnpike, and that was also the Board's consensus.

Collective Bargaining Public Hearing

On November 10, the Board voted 6-3 (myself and Supervisors Buffington and Kershner opposed) to advance collective bargaining for County employees, with a final vote coming on December 7.

The collective bargaining ordinance is being prepared by County staff at the Board's direction, making the County the "applicant" at the hearing. I therefore objected to the Chair's decision to grant both SEIU and IAFF the same amount of time as staff, which they used primarily to object to various provisions in the ordinance that aren't exactly what they asked for, even though the ordinance itself is still slanted heavily in favor of labor interests. I have had major concerns with the level of influence that SEIU in particular has had on this process from the beginning and this was a continuation of that preferential treatment, which is typically not granted to those that aren't officially applicants at a County public hearing.

There are still several issues remaining that the Board will need to decide, some of which are really important. These include:

- How many bargaining units are authorized: The unions are asking for just two units one for firefighters and one for the rest of the entire County workforce. I think this is rather outrageous, and clearly NOT in the interest of County employees who have many different job functions and shouldn't all have to be in the same bargaining unit. Staff is recommending there be four units.
- Binding arbitration: In binding arbitration, the County is required to go to a third party arbitrator if there is no agreement between the County and the union on various issues. This means that the Board of Supervisors is no longer the final decision-making authority on what could be very significant issues, and I have real concerns with that. In a Dillon Rule state, I also think it may very well be unconstitutional. County staff does not support binding arbitration.
- Labor Relations Administrator: Similar to the binding arbitration issue, the LRA is a third party position external to the County who would be responsible for implementing the ordinance and making binding decisions over compliance issues. The alternative that staff and I prefer is to have an Ombudsman, who is a County employee.

I don't know how the votes on these specific issues will go, but I'm hopeful that my colleagues are listening to staff. We happen to have staff that have a great deal of experience working in collective bargaining environments. While I believe that collective bargaining as a whole is unnecessary, the Board could really tie our own hands in the future if some of the items in the ordinance are adopted. Toys for Tots

Loudoun County Seeks Proposals from Rental Property Owners for Project-Based Vouchers

The Loudoun County Office of Housing will accept proposals until December 13 from the owners of rental property to contract with the County for Project-Based Vouchers (PBVs). PBVs will be awarded to rental property owners for assistance tied to specific housing units, which may be newly constructed or rehabilitated rental housing. PBVs may be awarded to the owners of affordable rental housing who provide fully accessible housing for people with disabilities. Housing units that are fully accessible and compliant with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 will be given priority.

Proposals will be evaluated based on owner experience and capability to manage or build rental housing as identified in the proposal. Proposals should address and include the following:

- The extent to which the project deconcentrates poverty and expands housing and economic opportunities.
- The extent to which it fulfills a critical housing need.
- A site location near transportation, education and employment centers.
- If applicable, the extent to which services for special populations are provided onsite or in the immediate area for occupants of the property.
- Location in a census tract undergoing significant revitalization as a result of federal, state or local dollars invested in the area.
- Location in a census tract where there are meaningful opportunities for educational and economic advancement.

Proposals must be submitted by 5:00 p.m. on Monday, December 13, 2021. The Loudoun County Office of Housing reserves the right to not award PBV contracts. Winter Weather Information

According to the National Weather Service, it is too early to tell what precipitation levels will look like this winter, but temperatures are expected to be slightly warmer than usual. VDOT will be ready to alleviate issues caused by snowfall when they do arise. VDOT hosted its annual winter weather briefing on November 15; they are responsible for clearing over 14,000 miles of road. They continue to encourage folks not to drive if it is snowing, and to be safe in the case of a winter weather event. If we do get snow, VDOT's goal is to have one passable lane on every road within 24 hours when snowfall is 2-4" and within 48 hours for 4-6". Over 6" is expected to take at least 72 hours. If you feel that your street is missed after these time frames have
