
Did you know February is Black History Month? In celebration of Black History Month, Loudoun County Public Library is offering programs to commemorate African American achievement and the Civil Rights movement. The Loudoun Freedom Center, my Voice for a Cause on February 6th, is also offering new and exciting programs (please see two upcoming programs in the events section of this newsletter). The Loudoun Freedom Center's mission is to eliminate injustice and engender hope, understanding and reconciliation through STEM research, historical preservation and education as it relates to the lives and contributions of the enslaved and other African Americans who lived in and may be buried throughout Loudoun County and Northern Virginia.

Ten years ago, I came to the Board of Supervisors asking them to recognize Black History Month. Every year since then, I've authored the resolution with Ms. Elaine Thompson's help. This year's resolution is a tribute to Ms. Elaine Thompson's life as one of the most influential voices on black history in Loudoun County.

Budget

The County Administrator, Tim Hemstreet, presented a **proposed budget** for the Loudoun County government to the Board of Supervisors for FY 2019 on February 14th. The budget totals \$2.3 billion in appropriations for the county government and Loudoun County Public Schools (LCPS).

The proposed budget is based on the equalized real property tax rate or \$1.09. The equalized tax rate is 3.5 cents lower than the current tax rate of \$1.125. At the Board's direction, Hemstreet provided two additional tax rate



options, an option at one cent higher than the equalized rate, \$1.10, and an option at one cent lower than the equalized rate, \$1.08.

The proposed budget at the equalized tax rate of \$1.09 maintains current County service levels but underfunds LCPS by \$10.8 million. The County continues to add approximately 11,000 residents every year, which brings additional service demands that cannot be absorbed by existing staff and static year-over-year funding. LCPS projects 1,483 additional students with the special needs population growing faster than the rate of total enrollment.

The School Board proposed budget achieves universal full-day kindergarten. I expected LCPS to take seven years to implement universal full-day kindergarten. It is astounding what LCPS and the School Board has done for full-day kindergarten in four years.

The dollar bill graphic is a representation of where tax dollars will be used under the proposed FY 2019 Budget.




We will hold three public hearings on the proposed FY 2019 budget. I hope you will attend one of these sessions to voice your opinions about the budget.

Route 15 North CPAM

An <u>amendment</u> to the Countywide Transportation Plan (CTP) is needed to widen Route 15 North from 2 lanes to 4 lanes between North King Street and Montresor Road. Improvements are to be constructed in conformance with the Heritage Resource Policies of the CTP and the Scenic Areas and Corridor Policies of the Revised General Plan and the Heritage Preservation Plan and include bicycle and pedestrian trails. To date, there have been 3 public input meetings attended by 239 residents and 2,500 responses to an online survey. I support widening for safety and the environment. During rush hour and special events, it is impossible for emergency vehicles to get to residents in communities like Raspberry Falls. Regarding the environment, idling cars sitting in traffic for 4 hours in the morning and afternoon, 5 days a week increases our carbon footprint. We have spent 25 years studying this corridor and it is time to move forward and do something to improve safety and congestion. This amendment is the first step, not the last, and we will continue to get input from residents. The CPAM was forwarded to the March 6th Board business meeting for a vote.



Substance Abuse Summit

Please save the date for my Substance Abuse Summit on Tuesday, April 17th from 9:00 am to 3:30 pm at the Northern Virginia Community College Loudoun Campus. The focus will be on prevention, treatment, self-help, legal aspects and life after recovery. Loudoun County Government, public safety, nonprofit organizations, faith communities, private industry, health providers, family and recovering addicts have come together to hold breakout sessions

where we talk frankly about this epidemic. I hope you can attend this informative community meeting.

The National Conference Center applicant has requested to defer their land use applications from the Thursday, February 22nd Board business meeting to the Thursday, March 22nd Board business meeting to allow more time to consider the community's concerns. Thank you for attending my community meeting in Lansdowne and for making your voices heard.

support to OAR clients in need. If you are unable to pack up complete kits, we still appreciate donations of the individual items!


Investing in Transportation

Segments of Loudoun County Parkway (Route 606) and Route 50 will have full closures in both directions during several weekends in February and March in order to allow Dominion Energy crews to place wire on new electric transmission structures. There will be up to two such closures per day lasting up to 15 minutes each. The closures will occur according to the following schedule, weather permitting:

- Sunday, Feb. 25: Loudoun County Parkway from Route 50 to Dulles West Boulevard between 7 am and 10:30 am.
- Saturday, March 3, Saturday, March 10 and Saturday, March 17: Route 50 from Poland Road to Tall Cedars Parkway between 7 am and 9:30 am.
- Sunday, March 4, Sunday, March 11 and Sunday, March 18: Route 50 from Poland Road to Tall Cedars Parkway between 7 am and 10:30 am.

Traffic shifts and detours are scheduled for the <u>Route 7/659 (Belmont Ridge Road)</u> <u>interchange project</u>. The work will consist of two phases and the impact of the two phases are as follows:

Phase One: The first phase of the work is scheduled to begin on or about March 20th weather permitting. The first phase opens traffic to the ramps and spurs on the west side of the bridge, eliminates the signal at existing Route 7, and puts Belmont Ridge Road traffic and the signal onto the interchange bridge. The phase one traffic shift will allow the contractor to begin construction of the ramps and spurs on the east side of the bridge concurrently. This phase is expected to take about two months to complete and will require traffic detours onto Route 7 eastbound from Belmont Ridge Road and onto Belmont Ridge Road from Route 7 westbound. 
