Speaking of being thankful, I don't want to miss the chance to recognize our veterans and active duty military who live and work in our community. DULLES UPDATES

Tall Cedars / Nations Intersection

The intersection of Tall Cedars and Nations Street has become an increasing problem. The County previously recognized this, and it was included in our Intersection Improvement Program for unsignalized intersections.

The traffic studies completed as part of the Intersection Improvement Program found that it ranked high for accidents in the County, and the frequency of accidents has accelerated since that last study (I have reviewed updated data provided by LCSO). The study also concluded that warrants are not met for a traffic signal. Specifically, there isn't enough volume on Nations Street. It is also fairly close to two other signalized intersections, which is also a factor. For a low volume intersection, the crash statistics are really concerning however.

Since we are lacking a signal warrant, the County's consultant has been working with VDOT on a proposal to restrict left turns from Nations onto Tall Cedars and block Nations traffic from crossing at the intersection - similar to Center Street / Loudoun County Parkway and Tall Cedars / Elk Lick. We will need to hear feedback from those of you that utilize the intersection and / or live close by before moving forward with this

or any similar proposal. Keep an eye out for information on my next Dulles Direct Town Hall Meeting, where I plan to have staff discuss the issues and the proposal that is being developed.

One thing we must figure out is timeline and whether this warrants acceleration. Currently, the Intersection Improvement Program begins receiving funding in FY22. Given the timeline that these would normally take, that would mean it wouldn't be completed until FY24. However with an increasing level of accidents, I am concerned that this won't be soon enough for a fix to come. On the other side of the coin, I also know that our capital budget is really constrained due to cost escalations on current projects, so this is going to be a challenge. Once we have the details scoped out and I have a cost estimate, I will do my best to get money to implement changes sooner.

Tall Cedars / Stone Springs Signal Update

I am in regular contact with project management to ensure that work on this intersection continues moving towards completion. On November 12, the construction project was posted on the procurement website for advertisement. We expect bids to start coming in soon, and procurement staff will be evaluating them in preparation for contract award. Foundation designs were submitted to VDOT this week for review.

Eminent Domain for Final Piece of Belmont Ridge Widening Project

If you've been paying attention to the widening of Belmont Ridge Road, you'll know it has been split into several smaller pieces and that the total project is almost complete. All we have left now is the section from Truro Parish Drive to Croson Lane. The problem we have encountered for the last several years is that we need a small amount of private right of way to complete the project. The contractor and our Department of Transportation and Capital Infrastructure could not reach a reasonable agreement with a few holdout property owners. One of the biggest

Loudoun County Government Master Calendar problems is that these landowners have simply been non-responsive to the County's offers.

At our November 13 Public Hearing, the Board approved the use of eminent domain to secure the rest of the needed right of way to complete the widening. In this case, the only property required is strip land by the road, some of which belongs to the utility and construction companies. There are no impacted homes.

Having the entirety of Belmont Ridge widened has been a long time coming, and I'm excited to see it finally complete. Right of way acquisition and utility relocation work are expected to continue until next summer and construction is expected to begin in 2021.

Whitman South

I have been talking about the Whitman South commercial application over the last few months. I wanted to give a brief overview since it was on our agenda at the November Public Hearing. The property is located at the southeast quadrant of Braddock and Gum Spring, west of Paul VI High School. At the Public Hearing, the Board voted unanimously to approve the zoning modifications, allowing an increase in project size to 57,000 square feet as well as an automotive service station and a small drive through restaurant (the item also reduced required buffer yard plantings adjacent to Braddock Road and reduced parking and building setbacks along Gum Spring Road). There was quite a bit of involvement from the Dulles Farms HOA in this case and I appreciate their work to help bring forward a better product from the applicant. This application ultimately did not change the basic plan or character of this property; it was already approved for a commercial site. The application does allow for some flexibility for end users that Van Metre has tentative agreements with in order to actually bring it to fruition. We did spend a lot of time looking at the traffic flow in and out of this project and staff ultimately had no concerns given the improvements underway at the intersection and the way the project has been aligned.

LOUDOUN UPDATES

Segra Field / Washington Spirit

Now that Loudoun United have concluded their inaugural season at Segra Field (and ended on a very high note, I might add!), we are looking ahead to the future of the complex and what we can do to utilize the facilities in addition to playing Loudoun United games there. For many months, I have been engaged in further discussions with DC United about bringing the Washington Spirit into the fold, who play in the National Women's Soccer League - the world's top women's soccer league. I am excited to announce that the DC United complex at Bolen Park will be the team's home for all their training. The Spirit will also be playing nine games at Segra Field there over the next couple seasons. Having these high skilled players - including some of the stars from the Women's World Cup Championship team - at Segra Field will be a great opportunity for the community and for this project. The Board is working on modifications to our agreement with DC United to reflect the need for increased training space and some site issues that were uncovered once the project was underway; those will be coming to a future Board meeting for discussion.

Firearms Discharge Update

On our November 7 Business Meeting agenda, the Board moved forward a proposal to address repeated incidents with firearms discharge during target shooting. The Transportation and Land Use Committee had discussed updating our County ordinance to include language on backstop requirements when target shooting. As you'll recall, the difficulty in the past has been in the ability of law enforcement to prosecute an individual or individuals when stray gunfire strikes property or people (we have had more than ten of these incidents recently). This item has gotten caught up in the politics of the overall gun issues, but it really relates to public safety and private property rights as well.

At the December 11 Public Hearing, the Board will be discussing language that right now reads: "The discharge of firearms for recreational or target shooting purposes shall be conducted in such a manner as to ensure that projectiles do not leave the boundaries of the property or parcel upon which the shooting is occurring, unless permission to do so has been granted by the adjacent landowner. A projectile leaving the boundaries of the property or parcel shall be prima facie evidence of a violation of this section." The Board did leave open further changes pending additional discussions with the Commonwealth Attorney and staff. We want to make sure the language we pass actually can be prosecuted. The advantage of this approach is that prosecutors would not have to prove exactly who fired which bullet; simply firing a weapon at all without an adequate backstop would be sufficient and that's a lot easier to prove. Hopefully we can get this resolved soon.

Loudoun Made / Loudoun Grown Initiative

Economic Development is sponsoring an initiative to promote the success of products and goods that are grown and made right here in Loudoun. The program highlights locally sourced food items such as farm-raised meats, local dairy cheeses, baked goods, local wine, beer, cider, and more. It also highlights goods made from local wool and fleece, horticultural products, and artwork produced by Loudoun artists. Participants in the program receive promotion from DED, but the important job is up to you as consumers to support these locally created goods. VDOT Snow Update

Experts aren't expecting this winter to be particularly severe, but VDOT will be ready to alleviate issues caused by snowfall just in case. They hosted their annual winter weather briefing on November 15. VDOT's fleet of snow removal equipment clocks in at 3,500 pieces this year. They are responsible for clearing 14,000 miles of road, and have a \$53.4 million budget to do so. VDOT is encouraging folks not to drive if it is snowing, and to be safe in the case of a winter weather event. If we do get snow, VDOT's goal is to have one passable lane on every road within 24 hours when snowfall is 2-4" and within 48 hours for 4-6". Over 6" is expected to take at least 72 hours.
