reflection and change. I do not have an ounce of doubt in my body that the Class of 2020 will take this unsatisfactory time and come out of it with something great.

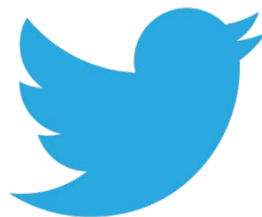
I want to draw some attention to possible Greenway toll increases of about 5% per year, over the next five years, that have been submitted by the Greenway for approval by the Virginia State Corporation Commission. Further down the newsletter, there is a chart illustrating the requested increases, and explanations of the different ways you can voice your opposition. I am speaking at a virtual public hearing next week to voice my adamant disapproval of the proposed increases, and encourage anyone who has the time to join me. If you do not have time for the public hearing, please consider submitting comments online through the links provided below.

In this issue of the Broad Run Bulletin you will also find some of the latest COVID-19 updates and resources (COVID information from previous Bulletins can also be accessed through the second green button below), including an update on Loudoun's libraries from the Broad Run District Library Trustee, Walt Purnell. Additionally, Loudoun is entering Phase 3 of the plan to reopen Virginia. This further eases restrictions on gatherings and businesses, but it does not mean the virus is gone. Everyone should still wear a mask when out in public, and, whenever possible, maintain a distance of at least six feet from other people.

Lastly, the 2020 Census is still ongoing. The Broad Run District is at approximately a 74.3% response rate, which is lower than Loudoun's 77.2% response rate. The areas with the lowest response rates are Ashby Ponds, Loudoun Station, and Dulles Town Center. Census takers will begin showing up, on August 11, to homes that have not filled out their census. Make sure you to fill out your census online at 2020Census.gov.

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COVID-19 Resources and Updates

Loudoun Enters Phase 3 of The Plan to Reopen Virginia

Virginia Governor Ralph Northam announced Tuesday that Loudoun County will enter Phase Three of the “Forward Virginia” reopening plan on Wednesday, July 1, 2020. Phase Three is the next step in gradually easing public health restrictions that are designed to slow the spread of COVID-19.

Phase Three of the plan: [Read Phase 3 Guidelines for All Business Sectors](#)

- Increases the number of people allowed to gather in groups from **50 to 250 people**; the restrictions do not apply to people performing functions of their employment.
- Allows **restaurants, breweries, wineries**, etc., to offer indoor service up to 100% capacity, in accordance with a number of guidelines, provided patrons are seated six feet apart.
- Allows **fitness centers, gymnasiums**, etc., to reopen in accordance with a number of guidelines, including keeping patrons at least ten feet apart and limiting the total number of attendees to 75% of the facility’s occupancy capacity.
- Allows brick and mortar **retail stores and personal grooming** businesses to operate up to 100% capacity provided six feet of distance be maintained between all work stations and customers.
- Allows outdoor and indoor **swimming pools** to open up to 75% capacity, provided ten feet of physical distance can be maintained between patrons not of the same household. Free swim is allowed.
- Allows people to attend **religious services** in accordance with a number of guidelines, including seating attendees six feet apart (except for family members), and disinfecting frequently-contacted surfaces before and after religious services.

While Loudoun County will move into Phase Three, Governor Northam's [Executive Order 63](#), which requires the use of face coverings in most public indoor locations, remains in effect until amended or rescinded by further executive order.

LCPS Return to School 2020 Planning

Loudoun County Public Schools, under the leadership of the [Loudoun County School Board](#), is planning how we will continue to fulfill our educational mission during the 2020-2021 school year, even in the face of continued uncertainty and challenges.

LCPS wants to maximize in-person, safe learning experiences for all our students in the 2020-2021 school year, and we know that many families and students share this priority. Our preference would be for 100% in-person learning, as long as we can provide learning experiences safely and in accordance with the requirements and recommendations of state and public health officials.

As LCPS looks ahead to the new school year, the [announcement](#) by Governor Northam on Tuesday, June 9, set forth guidance for LCPS and other Virginia school divisions for the 2020-2021 school year. The Virginia Return to School plan and the

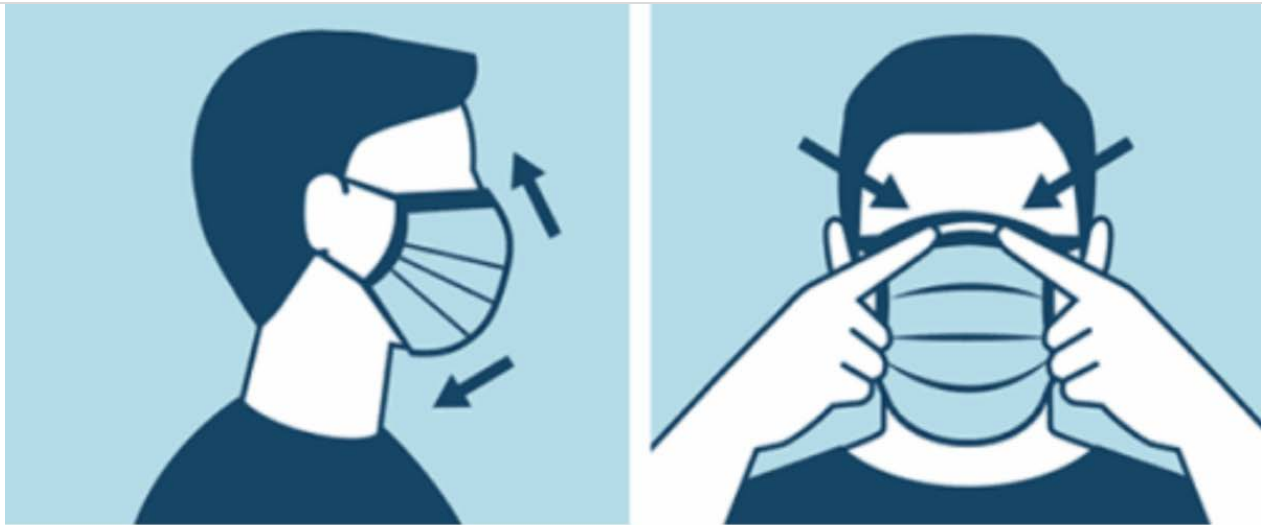
accompanying [Recover, Redesign, Restart 2020](#) report aligns school reopening phases with the [Forward Virginia Blueprint](#) phases, and outlines public health precautions for the new school year.

The health and safety of students, staff members and their families is paramount in Virginia's guidance, and it continues to be top of mind for LCPS. The announcement of the Virginia Return to School plan was accompanied by the issuance of a new order by Virginia's Public Health Commissioner. The [order](#) mandates that every public and private school in Virginia submit plans outlining their strategies for mitigating the public health risk of COVID-19 and complying with [U.S Center for Disease Control and Prevention](#) (CDC) and [Virginia Department of Health](#) (VDH) mitigation recommendations prior to reopening schools for the new year.

The approach we are able to implement at the start of the new school year will depend on which phase of recovery Northern Virginia is in at the time, based on the health conditions in our community then. Each phase of recovery involves different levels of mitigation to protect students and staff. Each level of mitigation will allow different numbers of students to occupy buses, classrooms and other common areas which must be considered in determining return-to-school plans.

What to do if People Are Not Wearing Cloth Face Coverings

For your own safety, do not confront these people or start an argument. Try to stay six feet away from people who are not wearing face coverings. You may also call or talk to the business owner about your concerns if you see staff or customers who are not wearing face covers in indoor public settings. To file an online complaint about [Executive Order 63 \(Face Coverings\)](#) and [Executive Order 65 \(Phase Two easing of certain restrictions\)](#) related only to cloth face coverings and capacity requirements, use this online [reporting form](#).

Loudoun County Officials Urge Caution for Beach Trips

If you're craving summer sun, sand and relaxation, how can you enjoy time at the beach and still keep yourself and others healthy?

COVID-19 "hot spots" are emerging at beach destinations in Delaware, Maryland, South Carolina and Virginia, as well as in vacationers' home communities, so it's important to keep your guard up for everyone's safety.

Parents of teens participating in senior beach week or other group gatherings should be particularly vigilant. This year, concerns about excessive partying and risky behavior are compounded by the additional risk of COVID-19. When young people from different households live in crowded group settings without physical distancing or wearing face coverings, they can put themselves and their families at greater risk of contracting the virus.

Loudoun COVID-19 Data Dashboards

Loudoun County's Office of Mapping and Geographic Information has updated [its COVID-19 page in the county's GeoHub](#) to include interactive dashboards that illustrate key metrics important for decision-making regarding the region's reopening. These dashboards include the "gating criteria" that are important in determining reopening timelines regionally and in the Commonwealth and also include other key measures. Blood and Plasma Donations

LCPS has partnered with the American Red Cross who reported that donor expectations were exceeded at three April Drives at LCPS schools. Mr. Steven Bratland, Red Cross Account Manager/Donor Recruitment, confirmed from these donation events 69 units were collected from 82 donors, 26 of which were first time donors. Mr. Bratland advised the donations from the three Drives have the potential of saving up to 207 lives. Loudoun County Public Libraries Update

Loudoun County Public Library Locations Open With Limited Service

Things will look a little different at your neighborhood branch, but our commitment to the community is unchanged. Here's what to expect.

- **Hours:** All branches, except the Law Library, are open Monday through Thursday, 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., and Friday and Saturday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Law Library is open 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- **Face masks** are required for all customers 10 and older to enter. If you do not have a face covering, one will be provided for you.
- **Social distancing:** Furniture has been moved and signage has been posted to help everyone stay six-feet from each other.
- **Curbside Pickup** service for items on hold will continue during operating hours.
- **Computer stations** are available for use by appointment. [Call your library](#) to schedule a session.
- **Printing and copying** are available.
- **Not available:** Meeting rooms, study rooms, teen centers, makerspaces, passport processing and public notarizations.
- **Storytimes and events** remain [online only](#).

For everyone's safety, please follow directions on signs and floor markers to help ensure social distancing between both customers and staff.



Update from Broad Run District Library Trustee, Walt Purnell

This is to brief you regarding the Library Board of Trustees virtual meeting on June, 17, 2020, where we approved a phased reopening plan for the Loudoun County Library System.

The reopening plan is consistent with County guidelines and Governor Northam's decrees, but I wanted to give you a little more detail.

Currently the LCPL is delivering "curbside service" and it has been well received by the public and the staff. The volume is significant and the public is happy to have even that reduced service available. The buildings, however remain closed. The phase 2 reopening plan allows a limited reopening of the buildings with a number of restraints.

Specifically,

1. The buildings will be limited to 50% of capacity.
2. Masks will be required of staff and the public and the County guidelines regarding issues will be followed.
3. Markings inside the buildings will direct the one-way flow in aisles and distancing.
4. Sneeze guards will be installed on all desks in service.
5. Limited computer availability by appointment.
6. Returns via bins and a 4 day quarantine on returned material.
7. Wifi will be available in buildings and parking lots.
8. Only online programs will be available.
9. Teen rooms, meeting rooms, passport and notary services, study rooms, maker space, and recording studios will remain closed.
10. Payments made only online, no cash exchanged.

An issue that the Trustees were concerned about is whether 50% occupancy is too aggressive and whether a smaller percent would better enable the staff to maintain the distancing guidelines. We do not anticipate attendance at the 50% level with so many of the popular services still unavailable, but Library management has been charged with monitoring conformance and if it looks like distancing guidelines are at risk they will pull back on the 50% occupancy to insure compliance.

The Board of Trustees did not make a decision on a phase 3 (full reopening) date, and we will be monitoring progress during phase 2 and, of course, watching for guidance from County and State regarding overall reopening.

Public Hearing on Greenway Toll Rate Increases

On January 23, 2020, Toll Road Investors Partnership II, L.P. ("TRIP II") [filed an application](#) with the Virginia State Corporation Commission ("Commission") for an increase in the maximum level of tolls on the Dulles Greenway ("Greenway"). In its application, TRIP II requests year-over-year increases in the maximum allowable toll rates for the next five years, beginning in 2021. As demonstrated in the following at the bottom of the write-up, TRIP II wants to raise rates between 6% - 7%, for each of the next five years.

The SCC Hearing Examiner has scheduled a telephonic public hearing to begin at **10:00 AM on June 30, 2020**. Each person wishing to comment will have up to five minutes to speak. This would be a great opportunity to provide your comments about the Greenway tolls publicly and directly to the SCC. As of today, this is the only scheduled public hearing and it is not known whether another hearing is planned. If you would like to publicly comment at this hearing, you will need to provide the SCC with your name and the telephone number that you wish the SCC to call during the hearing. This information **must be provided to the SCC by 5:00 PM, today, June 26, 2020** by (i) filling out a form on the Commission's website at scc.virginia.gov/pages/Webcasting; (ii) sending an email to SCCInfo@scc.virginia.gov; or (iii) calling 804-371-9141 during normal business hours.

If you do not wish to speak at the public hearing, you can still submit comments online or through the mail. Comment submission is open through August 24, 2020.

Should you desire to make a public comment at the public hearing, online, or by mail, the following is a list of points you may want to consider:

- TRIP II's request for a rate increase on the Greenway toll road amounts to over 30% over a five-year period.
- Northern Virginia is an important engine for the Virginia economy. This is the wrong time to increase costs for already struggling workers who will just be getting back to work after the COVID crisis.

- TRIP II's rate increase request is based on projections that cannot be relied upon today, much less looking forward for five years, because they do not take into account changes in people's travel habits due to COVID.
- TRIP II's high rates already unreasonably discourage travel on the toll road. The Northern Virginia population has steadily increased while traffic on the toll road has steadily decreased.
- While traffic on the toll road has decreased, traffic on the surrounding roads has increased dramatically as drivers who cannot afford the high rates of the toll road use alternate secondary routes. These drivers have determined that any benefits offered by the Greenway are not worth the high tolls.
- Increasing traffic on nearby roads creates a burden on the surrounding communities and VDOT, as maintenance costs for these roads must be passed on to the taxpayers of Northern Virginia.

Loudoun hopes that you will consider making your thoughts about the proposed increase of Greenway tolls known to the SCC. Next Household Hazardous Waste Event is June 27 in South Riding

The next Loudoun County Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) collection event is scheduled for Saturday, June 27, 2020, at Freedom High School, 25450 Riding Center Drive, South Riding, VA 20152, from 8:30 a.m. - 2:30 p.m.

What's Accepted:

- Loudoun residents are welcome to bring HHW from their homes to the event, free of charge. Typical HHW includes: fluorescent light bulbs, dry-cell batteries (alkaline, Ni-Cad, Lithium, rechargeable, etc), oil-based paint/stain/varnish, paint thinner, mineral spirits, metal polish, rust remover, wood strippers and preservatives, furniture polish, waxes, sealants and solvents, bleach, pesticides, insecticides, herbicides, fertilizer, pool chemicals, muriatic acid, sulfuric acid, ammonia, mercury, mercury thermometers and thermostats, gasoline, expired fuel, auto cleaners and flushes, brake and transmission fluid, windshield washer fluid, fire extinguishers, moth balls, flea and tick products, photographic chemicals and other hobby chemicals.

- Anyone who has an item that is not on this list is encouraged to call the county's Waste Management Division at 703-771-5500 to see if the item can be accepted or if an alternate disposal option is needed.

Social Distancing and Other Procedures:

- The HHW events include social distancing measures that help mitigate the spread of COVID-19. In accordance with Governor Northam's [Executive Order 63](#), members of the public will be required to wear face coverings at the point of service. Because of safety concerns related to various types of hazardous materials, the events feature a drive-through process in which residents are instructed to remain in their vehicles and allow event staff to unload any items accepted for disposal. In order to achieve adequate social distancing between event staff and customers, items must be placed in the rear of the vehicle, such as the trunk of a car, the bed of a pickup truck or the very back of an SUV. Items will not be accepted if in the front seat, back seat or if the driver attempts to hand an item to staff. In addition, in order to ensure everyone remains in their vehicle while at the point of service, items must not be in plastic bags. Staff are not allowed to open any plastic bag containing HHW.
- The limit per household is 15 gallons of liquid HHW (container size not to exceed 5-gallon), and 40 pounds of solid HHW (container size not to exceed 5-gallon).
- Participants should be able to provide proof of Loudoun County residency such as a driver's license or utility bill.

What's Not Accepted:

- Motor oil, antifreeze, automobile batteries, propane tanks, helium tanks, CO2 tanks/cartridges, drywall compound and oil-based space heaters are not accepted at HHW collection events. These materials are accepted at the Loudoun County Solid Waste Management Facility, 21101 Evergreen Mills Road, Leesburg. Visit loudoun.gov/landfill for more information.
- Ammunition, explosives, fireworks, and gun powder are not accepted at the HHW collection events. For information about disposal of these items, contact the [Loudoun County Fire Marshal's Office](#) at 703-737-8600.
- Electronics are not accepted at the HHW collection events. Information on how to properly dispose of unwanted electronics is online at loudoun.gov/electronics.
- Medical waste and medications are not accepted at HHW collection events. Disposal information is available at loudoun.gov/hhw.

Accepted But Not Hazardous:

- Latex or water-based paint is accepted but is not considered hazardous. Residents are encouraged to take their paint directly to the Loudoun County Solid Waste

Management Facility, where it can be disposed of for a fee, Monday through Saturday, 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.

Non-Residential Hazardous Waste:

- Businesses and organizations in Loudoun that generate less than 220 pounds of hazardous waste per month are encouraged to visit loudoun.gov/bhwp or call 703-771-5500 for information about the county's Business Hazardous Waste Collection Program.

VDOT Repaving for 2020

VDOT has released their [map of roads that will be resurfaced in 2020](#). The exact dates for the road work are unknown at this time, as it is dependent on weather and contractor schedules. Resurfacing projects can last for a few days to a few weeks, depending on the size of the project.

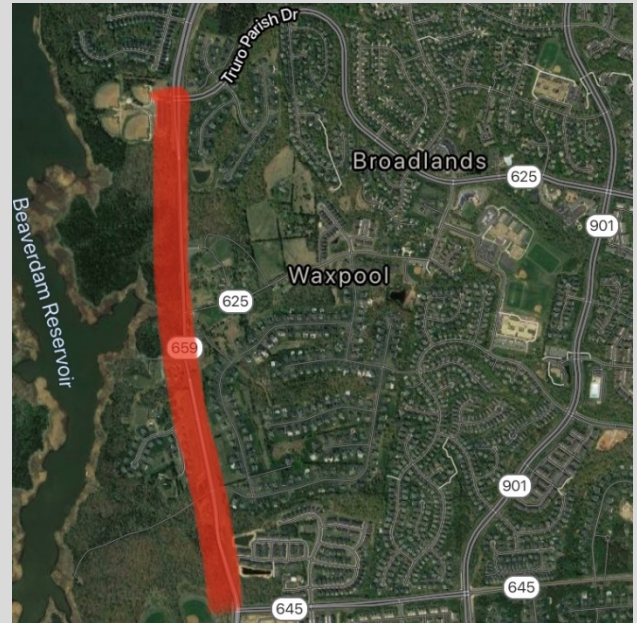


Ashby Ponds Traffic Signal **No Change**

VDOT has approved the signal modification to allow for signalized left turns out of Ashby Ponds Blvd and Smith Switch Rd. Those left turns must currently yield to oncoming traffic. The change will utilize a designated green left turn arrow that will become a yield flashing yellow arrow. Intersection and signal modifications will take a few months, but should be complete by the end of the year.

fitness room, a game room, a computer lab and an arts-and-crafts room.

Construction is estimated to be completed in spring 2021 and should open by fall 2021.



Belmont Ridge Road Widening I **No Change**

The widening of Belmont Ridge Road from Truro Parish Drive to Croson Lane will not be completed as soon as originally thought. Land acquisition and utility realignment are underway and should be completed in fall 2021. Environmental and grading plans have been submitted. The widening now has a target completion date of sometime by the end of 2024.



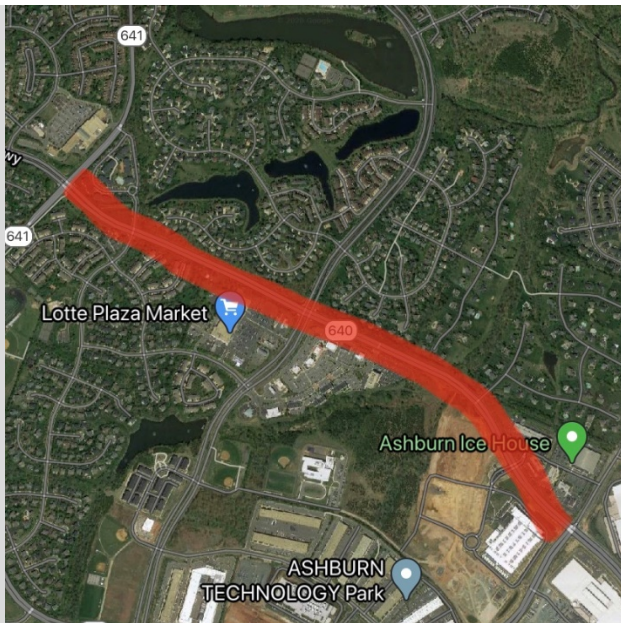
Belmont Ridge Road Widening II

Belmont Ridge Road now has two lanes in each direction at the Dulles Greenway interchange, completing four lanes from Riverside Parkway to Truro Parish Drive. On the bridge, the widening was done entirely within the existing deck. The project aims to reduce congestion and improve safety and operations by eliminating the previous bottleneck along a .5-mile stretch.



Evermoore Park

Evermoore Park, in the center of the Westmoore community off of Old Ryan Road, is in the process of being handed over from the developer to Loudoun Parks and Recreation. The county attorney's office is currently working through the final paperwork and should be complete within a few months. Once the county takes control, the fence will be removed and the park will be opened.



Farmwell Road Intersection Improvements

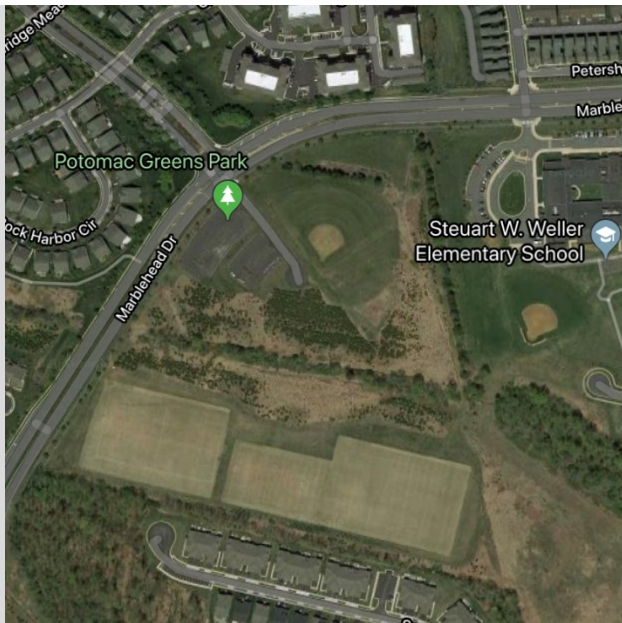
No Change

Intersection Improvements along Farmwell Road, from Ashburn Road to Smith Switch and Waxpool Roads, are in design stages. These intersection improvements are in lieu of widening Farmwell Road to six lanes. Design plans have been delayed and are scheduled to be completed in winter 2021. 60% Design plans will be submitted by late July or early August. [You can view initial 30% designs here.](#)



Pedestrian Improvements

Many projects are underway to identify missing sidewalk links, especially around Metro. VDOT's Metro Station Area Pedestrian Improvements project provides almost \$40 million in funding for the design and construction of improvements near Metro. Loudoun also has its own Sidewalk and Trails Program to improve pedestrian connectivity, with around \$75 million in funding for the design and construction of, on average, three to five miles of new sidewalks and trails every year.



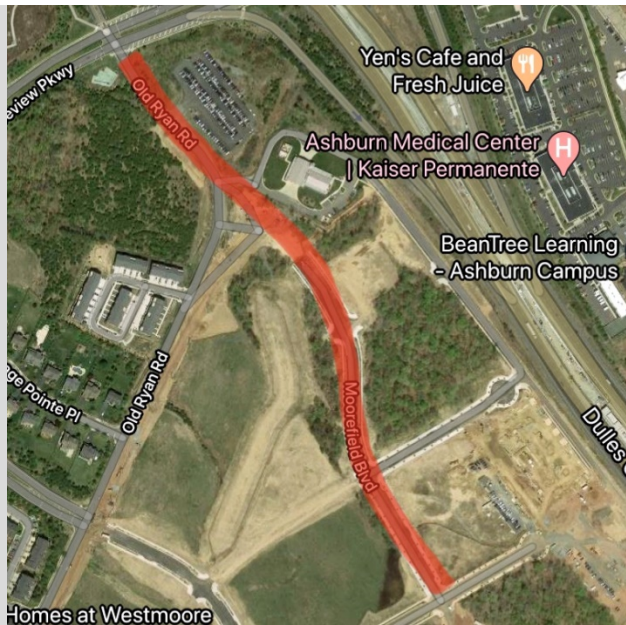
Potomac Green Park **No Change**

[This project](#) provides funding to complete and provide furnishings and equipment at the Potomac Green Community Park. It is being constructed by a developer as an in-kind proffer and the 28-acre park site was proffered to the County. This quarter, the bids were received on March 31, 2020 and Staff is currently reviewing the bids. In the next quarter, the contract will be awarded, pre-construction meetings will be held, notice to proceed will be issued, and the contractor will mobilize. View project information [here](#).



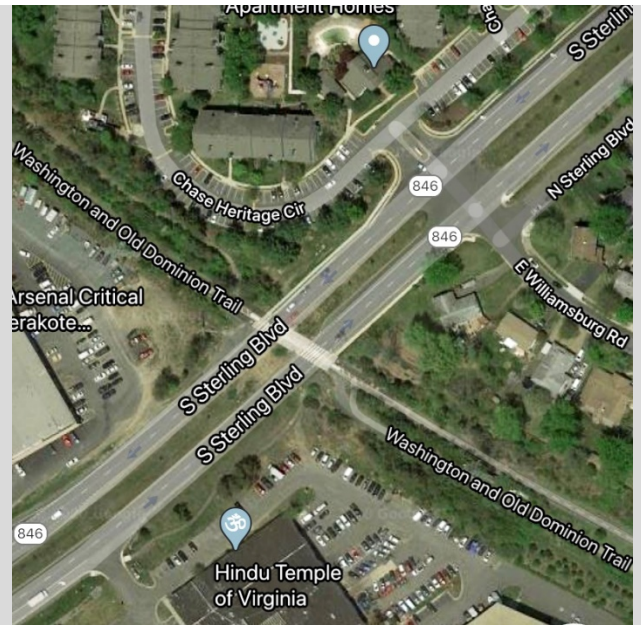
Metro Silver Line

Metro will reopen six Fairfax County stations and restore Silver Line service on August 16—weeks earlier than originally planned. The new reopening date reflects the progress made to date on two fronts: first, crews working to rebuild deteriorating station platforms are making excellent progress, and trains will be able to pass through East Falls Church station without stopping by mid-August; and second, MWAA contractors have completed the "phase 2" extension work that necessitated the temporary suspension of Silver Line service.



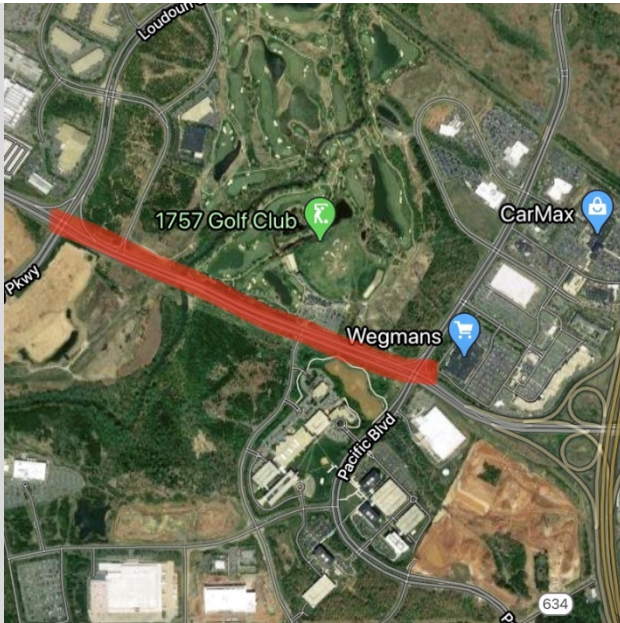
Moorefield Boulevard Construction **No Change**

This project provides for the planning, design, right-of-way acquisition, and construction of the Moorefield Boulevard roadway from Mooreview Parkway to Moorefield Station, and the construction of a traffic signal at Moorefield Boulevard and the Moorefield Station Fire and Rescue Station and access gate to Vinegar Hill Drive. Due to the extended time needed to obtain approval of the signal justification report, design completion is being extended from Summer 2020 to Winter 2021.



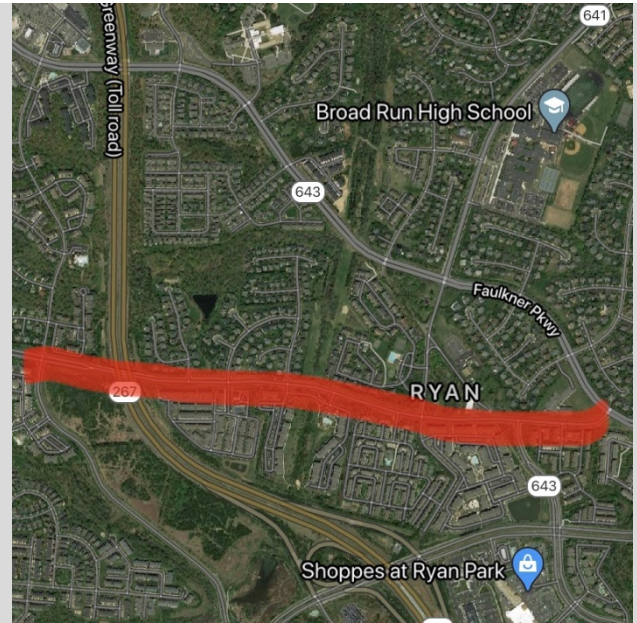
W&OD Crossing at Sterling Boulevard **No Change**

This project provides for the design, right-of-way acquisition, and construction of an overpass across Sterling Boulevard at the Washington & Old Dominion (W&OD) Trail. VDOT has agreed to perform the project's survey on the County's behalf using VDOT funds. In this quarter, VDOT initiated a survey of the project corridor. When survey activities are completed, DTCI staff will work to develop a scope to perform project planning, environmental investigations, and initial design.



Waxpool Road Intersection Improvements I **No Change**

This project funds intersection improvements and turn lanes at Waxpool Road and Pacific Boulevard, intersection improvements and turn lanes at Waxpool Road and Broderick Drive, and intersection improvements and turn lanes at Waxpool Road and Loudoun County Parkway. Road and utility design plans are still being reviewed and submitted before final approval. Right-of-way and land acquisition are continuing.



Waxpool Road Intersection Improvements II **No Change**

In November 2019, a study was completed on the safety of intersections along Waxpool Road from Demott Drive to Faulkner Parkway. County staff recommended both short-term and long-term solutions for heavily trafficked intersections along that corridor. You can read the study and recommendations [online \(PDF\)](#). Construction on intersections improvements will happen in phases as funding is allocated.
