Chesapeake Bay Watershed



Loudoun County lies within the Chesapeake Bay Watershed, the largest estuary in the United States. The Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act requires the use of effective management of stormwater pollution.

Ordinance/Enforcement

Loudoun County has a Stormwater Ordinance (Chapter 1096) that makes it illegal to cause or allow illicit discharges to the County's stormwater management system.

The County has implemented an illicit discharge detection and elimination (IDDE) program to identify, monitor, trace and inspect illicit discharges to stormwater drains, ditches, creeks, etc. The ordinance allows the County to enforce removal and/or remediation of illicit discharges as well as fine owners, operators or responsible parties.



Report Illegal Dumping and Discharges

How to Report an Illicit Discharge:

If you suspect an illegal discharge is being released into the storm sewer system you can report it to the County in any of the following ways:

- Use the Mobile App Loudoun Express Request (LEx) www.loudoun.gov/lex

When reporting, try to include the following

- Date and time of incident
- Location of dumping or discharge
- Digital photos and/or description of incident observed
- Vehicle description and license plate information of vehicle, if applicable


