When not working for Prince William County as the Nature Resources Section Chief, Clay Morris is an avid forager, gardener, and ecologist. His interest in ethnobotany has led him to a collaboration with the Pamunkey Indian Reservation in King William County to document the tribe's use of native plants as both food and medicine. As a consummate "foodie", he explores the wide repertoire of foraged foods through the lens of history, food culture, and the sheer enjoyment of using old foods in new ways.
